Introduction

Uva Wellassa University (UWU), established on 1 June 2005 as the 14th National University in the Sri Lankan State University system, is the first Entrepreneurial University in the country. Guided by its mandate to produce graduates with scientific, technological, and entrepreneurial competencies, UWU continues to play a pivotal role in contributing to Sri Lanka's socio-economic development.

Located on a scenic 64-acre mountainous site in Badulla with panoramic views, UWU provides an inspiring academic environment supported by modern facilities. The university commenced operations in 2006 with 153 students, 25 staff members, and five study programmes under three faculties.

By 2024, UWU has grown into a vibrant academic community of 4,738 undergraduate students pursuing 16 degree programmes across five faculties, supported by 360 permanent staff members serving in academic, administrative, and service divisions. The university also offers postgraduate degrees, external degree programmes, demand-driven certificate and diploma courses, and open and distance learning opportunities, expanding its reach beyond the main Univer.

Over the past 19 years, UWU has made significant strides in infrastructure development, academic innovation, and research excellence. In 2024, the university further strengthened its research and development activities, fostered industry partnerships, and introduced new initiatives aimed at adding value to the national resource base. With a strong emphasis on quality, relevance, and innovation, UWU continues to expand higher education opportunities while maintaining its reputation as a centre of excellence in value addition to natural resources base and entrepreneurial education in Sri Lanka

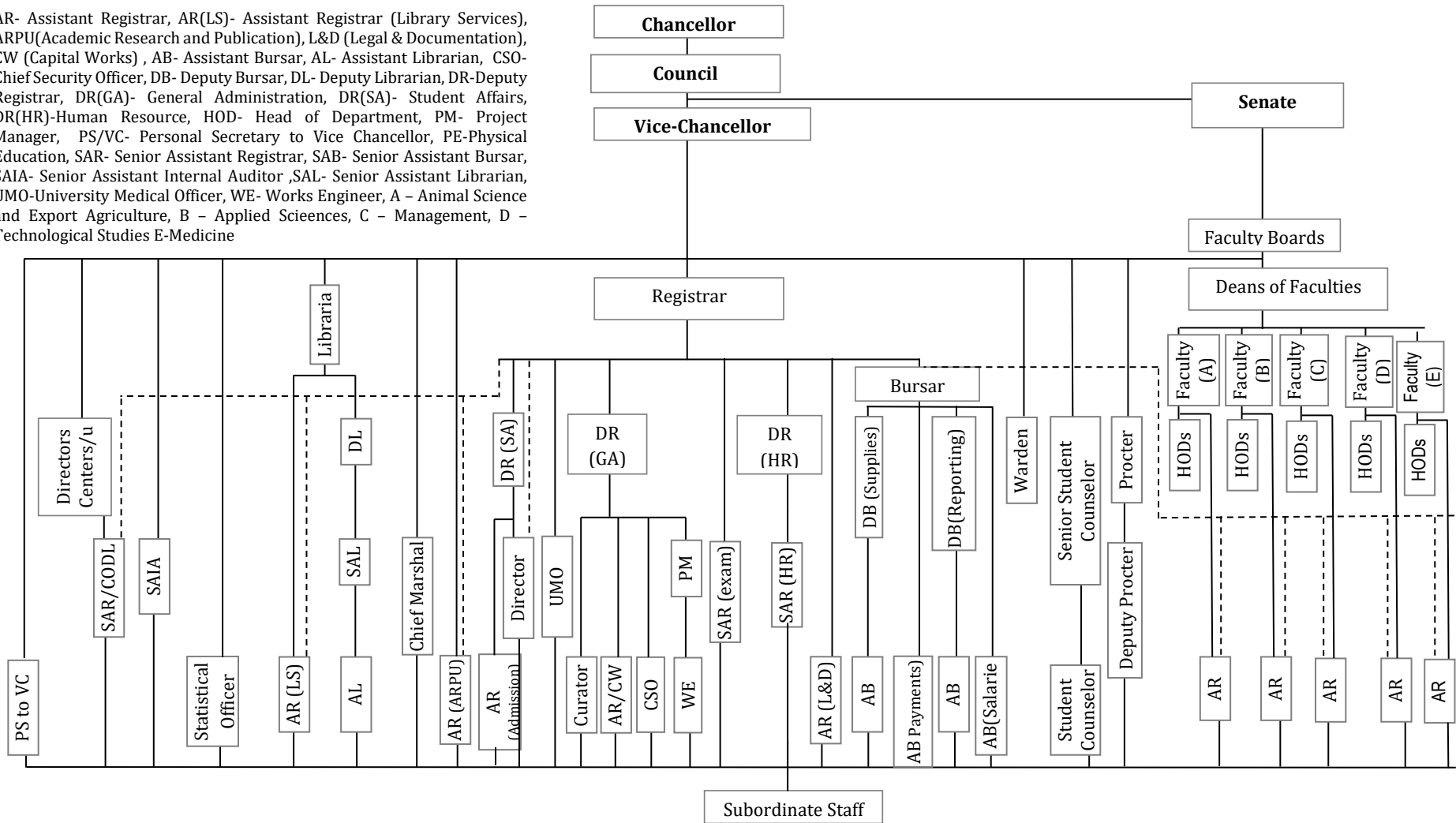

1.1 Brief Introduction

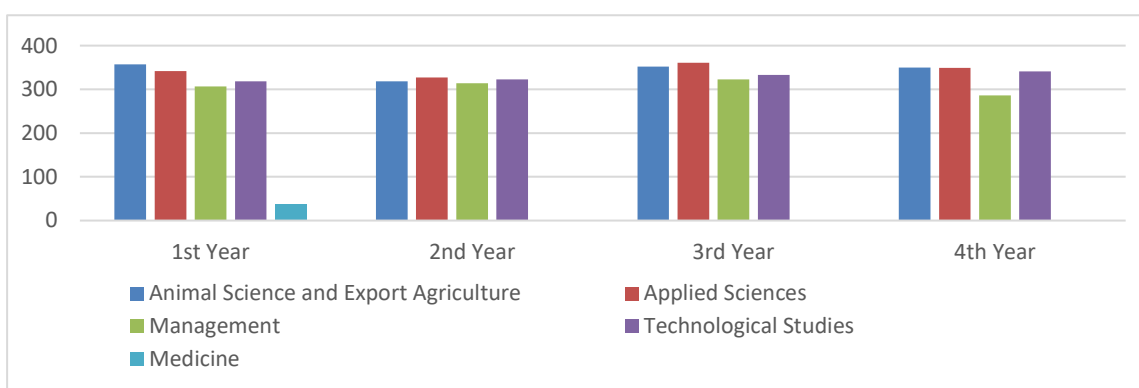

The University comprises five faculties and currently offers 18 innovative undergraduate degree programmes designed to meet both local and global demands. Each programme integrates academic rigor with practical relevance, reflecting UWU's commitment to producing industry-ready graduates and future leaders.

1.1.1 Details of Student Population and Graduate Output

By the end of 2024, Uva Wellassa University maintained a vibrant undergraduate student population of 5,340 students enrolled across 20 degree programs under the Faculties of Animal Science and Export Agriculture, Applied Sciences, Management, Technological Studies, and Medicine. The student distribution remained steady across all four academic years, with the highest concentration observed in the Faculties of Technological Studies and Applied Sciences. The Faculty of Medicine, having commenced its inaugural batch, continued with 39 students in the first year. Notably, the university witnessed a commendable graduate output during the year, with a significant number of students completing their academic programs successfully. The sustained graduate output reflects the university's commitment to academic excellence and its pivotal role in producing competent graduates to meet emerging industry and societal needs.

Over the period from 2014 to 2024, Uva Wellassa University produced a total of 5,941 graduates across its undergraduate degree programmes. The highest number of graduates emerged from the Entrepreneurship and Management programme (591), followed closely by Computer Science and Technology (576), and Hospitality, Tourism and Events Management (569), reflecting the strong demand for these disciplines in the national and global job markets. Degree programmes such as Animal Science, Export Agriculture, and Aquatic Resources Technology also recorded consistently high outputs, each contributing over 450 graduates. Newer programmes like Engineering Technology and Biosystems Technology have shown promising trends since their inception in 2021, together producing nearly 600 graduates within a short span. The steady rise in annual graduate numbers demonstrates the university's sustained academic growth and its capacity to meet higher education and industry needs effectively.

The General Convocation for the 2023 batch was successfully held on June 6, 2025 at the Magam Ruhunupura International Convention Centre (MRICC), reflecting the university's commitment to upholding academic ceremonies and celebrating student achievements.

1.1.2 Overview of Academic, Administrative and Non-Academic Staff

The University's human resource base continued to evolve in 2024 to support its growing academic and administrative responsibilities. As of the end of the year, Uva Wellassa University recorded a total permanent staff cadre of 364, comprising academic, administrative, academic support, library, and non-academic personnel. The academic staff included 23 Professors, 2 Associate Professors, 82 Senior Lecturers, and 86 Lecturers (including probationary staff), demonstrating a notable progression in academic appointments and internal promotions. While there was a slight reduction in total staff

compared to the previous year, the overall academic strength remained robust, aligned with institutional priorities and national quality benchmarks.

The administrative and non-academic staff components were maintained at adequate levels, with 17 administrative officers, 5 academic support staff, 3 library staff, and 146 non-academic personnel.

The University continues to engage in strategic recruitment and staff development initiatives, in keeping with UGC policies, to sustain a competent and responsive workforce that can meet the demands of a dynamic higher education environment.

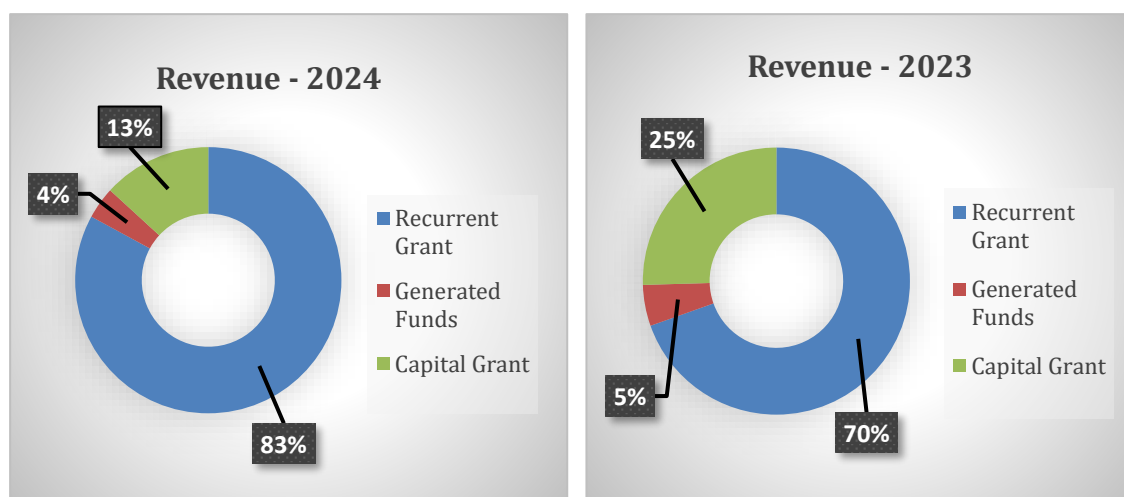

1.1.3 Financial Highlights

The financial progress of recurrent and capital expenditure incurred during the year 2024 is indicated below. Accordingly, out of recurrent expenditure, 83% of total expenditure was made to meet personal emoluments and the balance was incurred to meet other expenses. Out of the Capital Expenses, 13% was utilized for building Constructions and other capital expenditure.

1.2 Achievements

In spite of the effects of the global pandemic, in the year 2024, UWU was able to attain several achievements in infrastructure, learning and teaching, research and development activities, physical and human resources and community outreach services as described below. The outstanding accomplishment of UWU is a testament to the dedication and resourcefulness of the staff and students who responded to necessity with a practical willpower to confront adversity and get the job done.

1.2.1 Infrastructural Achievements

1.2.1.1 Construction of the Rooms Division Management Training Facility

The construction of the Rooms Division Management Training Facility, intended to strengthen the practical training component of the Department of Tourism Studies, officially commenced on 18th October 2024 with a ceremonial foundation stone-laying event. This facility aims to provide students with industry-standard, hands-on experience in hospitality operations, thereby enhancing the quality and relevance of tourism education at Uva Wellassa University

1.2.1.2 Commissioning of the Anatomy Laboratory

On 21st March 2024, the Faculty of Medicine marked a significant milestone with the official commissioning of the newly established Anatomy Laboratory. This facility was developed to meet the essential teaching and learning requirements in human anatomy for medical undergraduates. Equipped with modern infrastructure and resources, the laboratory provides a well-structured environment for conducting dissections, practical sessions, and demonstrations. The establishment of this dedicated space reinforces the university's commitment to enhancing the quality of medical education and supporting a hands-on, experiential learning approach for students.

1.2.1.3 Anatomy Laboratory Extension Building

In 2024, significant enhancements were undertaken to upgrade the infrastructure of the Anatomy Laboratory at the Faculty of Medicine, aiming to support the growing academic and practical demands of medical education.

Construction of the Anatomy Laboratory Extension Building commenced on 6th May 2024 and is scheduled for completion by April 2025. This extension will significantly expand the current laboratory facilities, providing increased capacity and improved functionality to better serve students and academic staff.

In parallel, efforts to modernize the internal environment began with the installation of new curtains on 26th March 2024. This project, expected to be completed by 10th October 2024,

is designed to enhance privacy and improve the overall interior conditions of the laboratory to create a more conducive learning environment.

To further strengthen the security and delineation of the laboratory premises, construction of a metal fence was initiated on 19th April 2024 and is expected to be completed by 19th October 2024. This fencing project plays a crucial role in safeguarding valuable academic infrastructure and ensuring a secure setting for students and staff.

Together, these coordinated efforts represent a comprehensive upgrade to the Anatomy Laboratory, reinforcing the university's commitment to delivering high-quality medical education through improved infrastructure and student support.

1.2.1.4 Medical Faculty's Computer Laboratory

The establishment of a dedicated Computer Laboratory for the Faculty of Medicine began on 1st September 2024. This facility is designed to support computer-based learning, research, and digital access to academic resources. The laboratory is projected to be completed by April 2025, contributing significantly to digital transformation in medical education at UWU.

1.2.1.5 G-Block Canteen

The construction of a new canteen near the G-Block commenced on 30th August 2024 to address the increasing demand for student and staff dining facilities. With a planned completion date of 26th June 2025, the project will enhance the welfare and convenience of the university community by providing a modern and hygienic food service area.

1.2.1.6 Medical Faculty Complex – Phase I – 5 Storied

A comprehensive proposal for the Phase I construction of a five-storied Medical Faculty Complex was submitted to the University Grants Commission (UGC) in November 2024. This proposed development aims to provide state-of-the-art facilities including lecture halls, laboratories, and administrative spaces, catering to the growing needs of the Faculty of Medicine and aligning with the university's long-term academic infrastructure goals. Academic and Research Achievements

In collaboration with the Badulla Municipal Council, Uva Wellassa University contributed to the establishment of a model leachate treatment plant and an analytical laboratory facility. These initiatives support sustainable waste management and environmental monitoring in the region.

1.2.4.2 Soba Ruu 2024-Department of Tourism Studies, Uva Wellassa University

The Department of Tourism Studies' first-year undergraduates of the HTE degree programme organized Soba Ruu 2024 to raise public awareness about preserving the ecosystem of the Badulla district. The event promoted a "Greenery Environment" concept and aimed to attract tourists by enhancing the natural cleanliness and appeal of the area.

1.2.4.3 Tree Plantation Program near the Anatomy Laboratory

The MBBS Batch 2022/2023 successfully organized and completed a Tree Plantation Program near the Anatomy Laboratory, contributing to campus greening efforts and environmental conservation.

1.2.5 Distance Learning

In 2024, the Centre for Open and Distance Learning (CODL) at Uva Wellassa University continued to grow and improve, playing an important role in making education more accessible to everyone. The Centre built on its past work by improving its online systems and using new teaching methods to make learning easier and more effective.

Throughout the year, CODL offered many online courses, training sessions, and virtual events. These helped students learn in a flexible and interactive way from anywhere. The Centre also made sure students had the support and resources they needed to succeed.

CODL quickly adapted to new challenges and worked hard to meet the needs of all learners. In 2024, it remained a key part of the university's goal to provide quality education to people from all areas.

The first semester of the third year is currently underway, with lectures being conducted in a hybrid learning model, combining both in physical and online classes.

1.2.5.1.3 Bachelor of Business Management (BBM) (External)) Degree Programme – 3rd Intake

The 3rd intake of the Bachelor of Business Management (BBM) (External) degree programme has successfully completed the mid-year end examinations. The second semester of the first year is currently underway, with lectures being delivered in a hybrid learning model, combining both in- physical and online classes.

1.2.5.1.4 Bachelor of Business Management (BBM) (External)) Degree Programme – 4th Intake

The 4th intake of the Bachelor of Business Management (BBM) (External) degree program has successfully completed the student registration process. The inauguration ceremony for this intake is scheduled to take place on 23rd March 2025.

1.2.5.1.5 Bachelor of Scinec (BSc) (External)) Degree Programme – 1st Intake

The 1st intake of the Bachelor of Science (BSc) (External) programme commenced on 6th April 2024, with a total of 60 students enrolled. The students have successfully completed the first-year mid examinations. The second semester of the first year is currently underway,

with lectures being conducted in a hybrid learning model, combining both in physical and online classes.

1.2.5.1.6 Bachelor of Science (BSc) (External) Degree Programme – 2nd Intake

The 2nd intake of the Bachelor of Business Management (BBM) (External) degree programme has successfully completed the student registration process.

1.2.7 Library

The Uva Wellassa University Library continues to be a cornerstone for academic excellence, supporting teaching, learning, and research through comprehensive access to quality information resources. The library offers a broad range of services, including reference materials, lending, e-resources, and advanced ICT facilities, effectively meeting the evolving needs of students and staff.

1.2.7.1 Library Development and Facilities

Since its establishment in 2006, the library has grown substantially, culminating in the opening of a purpose-built, three-story building on 5 December 2022. This modern facility is designed to enhance the learning environment with dedicated spaces such as permanent reference and lending sections, periodicals, e-resources and ICT sections, special collections, reading and discussion areas, postgraduate research space, and a library auditorium. The library currently supports over 6,000 users and maintains a collection exceeding 26,000 printed materials across diverse disciplines. Classification is managed using the 23rd edition of the Dewey Decimal Classification (DDC) system, while the KOHA open-source Library

Management System ensures efficient resource management and service delivery. Additional amenities include free Wi-Fi and air-conditioned comfort throughout the premises.

1.2.7.2 Library Services and Facilities

The Uva Wellassa University Library serves a diverse community of over 6000 users, including students and staff. Committed to providing high-quality services, the library ensures efficient access to relevant information to support teaching, research, and learning. The library offers a wide range of services through its various sections, including:

- Permanent Reference (PR) Section
- Lending Section
- Periodicals Section
- E-Resources & Information Communication Technology (ICT) Section
- Special Collections
- Information and Learning Commons (reading area)
- Additional Reading Areas
- Discussion Areas
- Research Space for Postgraduate Students
- Library Auditorium

The library's collection consists of over 26,000 printed materials covering diverse subject areas. It follows the 23rd edition of the Dewey Decimal Classification (DDC) system and utilizes the KOHA open-source Library Management System to enhance efficiency and improve user services. Additionally, the library provides access to subscribed e-resources, databases, and a selection of free e-resources to support academic and research needs.

The library provides free Wi-Fi and air-conditioned facilities for users.

1.2.7.3 Library Cells and Society

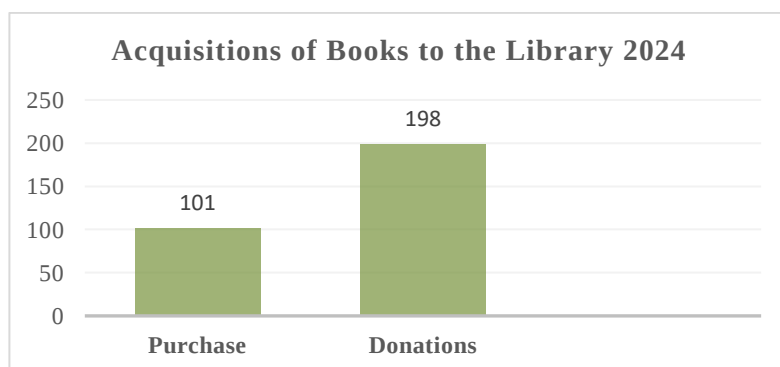

1.2.7.4 Reader Services and Outreach

Orientation programs for first-year undergraduates were conducted at the Library Smart Auditorium by the Acting Librarian, Dr. K.M.R.K. Kulatunga, alongside Information Assistants who introduced various library sections. The library also extended its outreach by hosting visits from six schools, where introductory sessions about library services were delivered by the Acting Librarian and staff, promoting academic resource awareness among prospective university students.

1.2.7.5 Acquisitions of Books to the Library 2024

The library continued to expand its collection in 2024 by acquiring new books and resources to support the curriculum and research activities, further enriching the academic environment for the university community.



1.2.8 Sports Activities

2.3 Hostels

The Uva Wellassa University provides hostel accommodation for a significant number of students through both university-owned hostels and rented hostels. Hostel facilities are extended to non-medical undergraduates in their first, third, and fourth years, and to medical undergraduates in their first, second, and fifth years. A total of 504 students are accommodated in university-owned hostels located within the campus premises, while additional students are housed in rented hostels located nearby.

2.3.2 Rented Hostels

Students who cannot be accommodated in university-owned hostels are provided accommodation in rented hostels. A detailed list of rented hostels and their capacities is presented in Section 2.4.2. The annual hostel fee for students in rented hostels is Rs. 3,500/- , while students in university-owned hostels pay Rs. 5,000/- per academic year.

2.3.3 Hostel Allocation Policy

- Non-Medical Students
 - Semester 1 and 2:
 - Fourth Year: 100% allocation for all applicants.
 - First Year: 100% allocation for all applicants. If the number of applicants exceeds available places, allocation is done based on merit (academic marks).
 - Third Year: Allocation is based on availability and merit.
- Medical Students
 - Semester 1 and 2:
 - First, Second, and Fifth Year students are granted 100% hostel allocation.

This structured allocation policy ensures that priority is given to students in critical academic years while maintaining fairness and transparency in the distribution of hostel facilities.

- The Mahapola Scholarship, a government-led initiative, financially assisted numerous deserving students, aiding them in pursuing their undergraduate studies without fiscal hindrance. Mahapola Scholarship is made up of a combined contributions of Mahapola Trust Fund Rs. 2,600/- (merit) or Rs. 2,550/- (ordinary) plus University Grants Commission Rs. 2,450/-. Hence, in total, a student receives a sum of Rs. 5,050/- per installment for merit and Rs. 5,000/- for ordinary scholarship.
- At the same time, the bursary scholarships were extended to students facing economic hardships, ensuring that no brilliant mind is left behind due to financial constraints and under Bursary scholarship Students are paid Rs. 4,000/-. Selection process for the Bursary Scholarship is carried out by university and the fund is released by the UGC.
- Both the scholarship Payments are made in 10 installments per academic year, and these scholarships have not only eased the burden on students and their families, but they've also reinforced our university's core value of promoting inclusive education.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND DISCLOSERS

1. General Information

1.1 Reporting Entity

Uva Wellassa University has been incorporated under the Universities Act No.16 of 1978, and located at Passara Road, Badulla, Sri Lanka. University is functioned under the University Grants Commission and Ministry of Education, Higher Education and Vocational Education.

1.2 Date of Authorization for Issue

The Financial Statements of the Uva Wellassa University were authorized for issue by the Council dated on 28.02.2025.

1.3 Reporting Period

The Financial Period of the University represent from 01st January 2024 to 31st December 2024.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

2.1 Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements of the University have been prepared and presented in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSAS's). However, Sri Lanka Accounting Standards also have been used in the areas where no Public Sector Accounting Standards are available. These Financial Statements comprise the Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Cash Flows, Statement of Changes in Equity and Notes to the Financial Statements.

2.2 Basis of Measurement

The Financial Statements of the Uva Wellassa University have been prepared on the historical cost basis and apply consistently. No adjustments have been made for inflation factors affecting to the Financial Statements except for the Property, Plant and Equipment measured at fair value.

2.3 Comparative Information

All accounting policies adopted by the University are applied consistently with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in presentation of current year figures.

2.4 Materiality and Aggregation

Each material class of similar items have presented separately in the Financial Statements. Items of dissimilar nature or function have presented separately unless they are immaterial.

2.5 Offsetting

Assets and Liabilities, Revenue and Expenses have not been offset unless required or permitted by SLPSAS.

2.6 Going Concern

The Uva Wellassa University has assessed the ability to continue as a going concern. The Council of Uva Wellassa University has a reasonable expectation that the University has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. University does not foresee a need for liquidation or cessation of operations, taking into account all available information about future. Accordingly, the University continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

2.7 Events After the Reporting Period

All material events after the reporting date have been considered and where appropriate adjustments or disclosures wherever necessary have been made in the Financial Statements.

2.8 Functional & Presentation Currency

Items included in the Financial Statements of the University are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the University operates (the functional currency). These Financial Statements are prepared and presented in 'Sri Lankan Rupees' (Rs.), which is the University's functional and presentation currency.

2.9 Transaction of Foreign Currencies and Balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions or valuation where item are re measured. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance.

2.10 Rounding

The amounts in Financial Statements have been rounded-off to the nearest rupee, except otherwise indicated as permitted by the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

2.11 Property, Plant & Equipment (PPE)

The University's Property, Plant & Equipment (PPE) includes Land, Buildings & Structures, Furniture & Fittings, Plant & Machinery, Office Equipment, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Motor Vehicles, Library Books and Cloaks.

a. Basis of Recognition

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognized if it is probable that future economic benefits associate with the item will flow to the entity and the cost of the item can be reliably measured.

i) Initial Recognition

All items of Property, Plant & Equipment are stated initially at cost and subsequently measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses. The cost of Property, Plant & Equipment comprises its purchase price and any directly attributable cost of bringing the asset to working condition for its intended use.

ii) Subsequent Expenditure on Existing Property, Plant & Equipment

Expenditure incurred on tangible fixed assets is charged to the Statement of Financial Performance in the period which is incurred, unless it meets one of the following criteria, in which case, it is capitalized and depreciated over the relevant useful life time.

- Increase in the capacity of the asset
- Substantial improvement in the quality of output or reduction in operating cost,
- Significant extension of the life of the asset beyond that confirmed by repair and maintenance.
- Market value of PPE has subsequently increased.
- Expenditure incurred on repairs or maintenance of Property, Plant and Equipment in order to restore or maintain the future economic benefits expected from originally assessed standard of performance, is recognized as an expense when incurred.

iii) Measurement after Initial Recognition.

a) Revaluation Model

After initial recognition, below classes of Property, Plant and Equipment, whose fair value can be measured reliably has been carried out at revalued amounts, which is fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent impairment losses.

Land
Buildings and Structures
Furniture and Fittings
Plant & Machinery
Office Equipment
Lab and Teaching Equipment
Motor Vehicles

The gain arising from revaluation of particular assets shall be identified in Revaluation Reserves in the Statement of Changes in Equity.

Carrying Value of Property, Plant and Equipment and Intangible Assets are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, then the assets recoverable amount is estimated. An impairment loss is recognized if the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performances.

iv. Library Books & Cloaks

Cost of Library books and Cloaks are depreciated on the straight-line basis over a period of 5 years.

v. Intangible Assets

Computer software and online journals have been recognized as intangible assets when it is probable that future economic benefits that are attributable to the assets will flow the enterprise and the cost of the asset can be measured reliably. Intangible assets acquired are stated at cost less accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. These costs are amortized over their estimated useful lives.

b. Depreciation

Depreciation of Property, Plant and Equipment other than Land, Buildings, Furniture & Fittings, Plant & Machinery, Office Equipment, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment and Motor Vehicles, is recognized in the statement of Financial Performance on the straight-line basis on each component of an item of property, plant and equipment. Depreciation of an asset begins when it is available for use and ceases at the earlier of the date that the asset is classified as held for sale and date that the asset is derecognized. The estimated useful life periods are as follows.

Depreciation after Revaluation

Revalued Assets shall continue to be depreciated following the revaluation over the remaining useful life of each category of assets.

c. Impairment of Assets

The assets are tested for impairment at the end of the reporting period. The assets residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period, an asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and gain/ (loss) is recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance.

d. Derecognition

The carrying amount of Property, Plant and Equipment is derecognized at the disposal or when no future economic benefits or service potential is expected from its use or disposal. The gain/ (loss) arising from derecognition shall be included in surplus or deficit when the item is derecognized.

2.12 Capital Work- in - Progress

Capital expenses incurred on PPE which are not completed as at the reporting date are shown as Capital Work - in -Progress and cost incurred on Capital Work - in - Progress is transferred to Property, Plant and Equipment when it is available for use.

2.13 Current Assets

Current Assets classified in Statement of Financial Position are those which are expected to be realized in, or consumption, in the University's normal operating cycle, expected to be realized within twelve months after the reporting date or cash or a cash equivalent.

2.14 Inventories

Inventories are stated at cost and determined on First in First out (FIFO) basis. Inventories mainly comprise of stationaries, chemical & glassware and other consumables. Inventories are for consumption and not for resale.

2.15 Advances to Staff and Receivables

Advances to staff and receivable comprises, festival advance and interest receivables.

2.16 Cash & Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are defined as cash in hand, demand deposits and short term highly liquid investments readily convertible to known amounts of cash and subject to insignificant risk of change in value. For the purpose of Cash Flow Statement, cash & cash equivalent includes cash in hand and deposits in banks. Investments with short term maturity of six months or less from the date of acquisition are also treated as cash equivalents. The cash flow statement is prepared based on the indirect method.

2.17 Employee Benefits

Defined Contribution Plans

Employees of the University are entitled for Universities Provident Fund (UPF) and Employees Trust Fund (ETF) in line with respective statutes and regulations. The University contributes 7% and 3% on basic emoluments plus cost-of-living allowance, academic allowances and monthly compensation allowances of the employees to the Universities Provident Fund and to the Employee's Trust Fund respectively. Further

University contributes 8% on basic emoluments plus cost-of-living allowance, academic allowances and monthly compensation allowances of the employees to the Universities Pension Fund as a retirement benefit. These are recognized as expenses in the Statement of Financial Performance as incurred.

Defined Benefit Plans

A defined benefit plan is a post-employment benefit plan other than a defined contribution plan. The defined benefit is calculated using projected unit credit method as recommended by SLPSAS 19 "Employee benefits". The present value of the defined benefit obligation is determined by discounting the estimated future cash outflows using interest rates that are denominated in the currency in which the benefits will be paid, and that have terms to maturity approximating to the terms of the related liability. The present value of the defined benefit obligations depends on a number of factors that are, determined on an actuarial basis using number of assumptions. Key assumptions used in determining the defined retirement benefit obligations are given in notes. Any changes in these assumptions will impact the carrying amount of defined benefit obligations.

Provision has been made for retirement gratuities from the beginning of service for all employees, in conformity with SLPSAS 19 on employee benefits. Provisions are made to all employees those who become eligible under the Gratuity Act No.12 of 1983, the liability to an employee arises only on completion of 5 years of continued service. This provision is not fully externally funded.

2.18 Liabilities and Provisions

2.18.1 Current Liabilities

Current Liabilities are stated at their book value.

2.18.2 Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the University has present obligations (legal and constructive) as a result of a past event, where it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

2.18.3 Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be continued by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the programme or a present obligation that is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation.

A contingent liability also arises in extremely rare cases where there is a liability that cannot be measured reliably. The uncertainty does not recognize a contingent liability but disclose its existence in the Financial Statements.

A contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the University.

The University does not recognize contingent asset but discloses its existence where inflow of economic benefits is probable but not virtually certain.

2.19 Revenue Recognition from Non-Exchange Transactions

2.19.1 Recurrent Grant

Recurrent grants are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on cash basis.

2.19.2 Government Grants Related to Capital Expenditure

Government Grants for the Capital expenditure have been recorded in Financial Statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard (SLPSAS) 11 Revenue from non-Exchange Transactions.

Revenue Recognition

An inflow of resources from non- exchange transactions recognized as an asset shall be recognized as revenue except to the extent that a liability is also recognized in respect of the same inflow. Revenue from the non-exchange transactions shall be measured at the amount of increase in net assets recognized by the entity.

2.20 Revenue Recognition- Exchange Transactions

2.20.1 Income from Self-Financed Programmes

Income from Self-Financed Programmes and other activities are recognized on accrual basis over the period of Courses and Degrees.

2.20.2 Expenditure Recognition

Expenses incurred in carrying out all activities of the University are recognized on an accrual basis and charged to the Statement of Financial Performance.

2.21 Statement of Cash Flows

The Statement of Cash Flows has been prepared by using the Indirect Method in accordance with the SLPSAS 2 whereby gross cash receipts and gross cash payments of operating activities, finance activities and investing activities have been recognized. Cash and cash equivalents comprise short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

2.22 Disclosures

2.22.1 Designated Funds

The fund designated by the University for a specific purpose with the approval of the Council are identified as a Designated Funds. The University Development Fund and Faculty Development Funds were established according to the provisions of University Act and guidelines issued by the UGC and transferring a percentage of income of the Self Financing Activities conducted by each Faculties and Centres. Unutilized funds are held in their respective fund accounts and included under funds and reserves in the Statement of Financial Position until such time as they are required. The Endowment Funds have been established aiming to providing scholarships to the students and appreciate the best performing students at the Convocation. The interest received by investing the fund will be used for this purpose.

2.22.2 Biological Assets

Live Stock consists living animals held for the practical activities and managed by the Faculty of Animal Sciences and Export Agriculture have been shown in the note - 6.2 in the financial statement according to the provisions of the SLPSAS 18.

2.22.3 Buildings rented out for Outside Parties

The University has rented out some of its buildings to State Banks, Postal Department, etc. at a nominal rental. These properties are not classified as investment property since these properties are not held either to earn rentals or for capital appreciation. Accordingly, these properties are also classified as PPE in the Statement of Financial Position

2.22.4 Investments

The University has invested temporary surplus funds lying to the credit of bank accounts on term deposits only at the State Banks. The interest accrued for same has been adjusted to the respective ledger accounts and shown as income "recurrent/exchange" in the Statement of Financial Performance. Similarly, the funds received for scholarships have also been invested in term deposits at the State Banks. Further details on investments and interest income on investments are disclosed in note 04.

2.22.5 Income from Self-Financing Activities

The University maintains separate ledger accounts for accounting of income and expenditure generated through Self Financing Activities (SFAs) ranging from Consultancy, Postgraduate taught courses, Short Courses, Part-time courses, External Degree Programs, Testing Assignments, etc. The expenditure accounted under individual ledger accounts are classified in to Expenses - SFA Activities and shown in the Statement of Financial Performance. The balances lying to the credit of these Self Financing Activities accounts are shown under Reserves in the Statements of Financial Position.

2.22.6 Foreign Currency Transactions and Balances

All foreign currency transactions are recognized as functional currency at exchange rates prevailing when the transactions occur. The balances of Residential Foreign Currency (RFC) accounts as at reporting date recognized into functional currency at the rates of the same date. Exchange gain/loss arising on translating the balances remained in the RFC accounts in previous financial statements and the current year financial statements are recognized as revenue/loss from Exchange Transactions of the Statement of Financial Performance. In the month of October 2024, the University Council decided to close out the foreign currency A/C No 88941499 which was maintained at Bank of Ceylon, Badulla Branch.

2.22.7 Intangible Assets

Intangible assets acquired separately are initially measured at cost. Subsequently it will be carried at its cost less any accumulated amortization under cost model in accordance with the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 20 (SLPSAS). All intangible assets with finite useful lives are amortized on straight line basis over its estimated useful life and charged to the statement of financial performance. Accordingly acquired computer software licenses are capitalized on the basis of the costs incurred to acquire and bring to use. These costs are amortized over their estimated useful life of five (5) years on straight line basis. Human capital development expenses are considered intangible asset and amortized over their estimated life.

2.22.8 Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development Operation (AHEAD) Project

The AHEAD Project has purchased the Rs. 17,096,857 value of fixed assets during the period from 01st November 2023 to 31st December 2023. These assets have transferred to the university and included in the Property, Plant and Equipment, and General Reserves in the Statement of Financial Position of the University.

2.22.9 ICT Infrastructure of and Secured Wi-Fi Network Connectivity Solution for Universities implemented by the Ministry of Education

The Ministry of Education has implemented the special project for expansion of Wi-Fi network connectivity solution for the universities. Under the above project, the Ministry of Education has awarded the tender to the Arrogange Technologies (Pvt) Ltd for expansion of Wi-Fi facility of Uva Wellassa University. Accordingly above assets value of Rs.37,350,317 included Property, Plant and Equipment and other records of the university books of accounts in year 2024.

2.22.10 Financing Additional Student Intake Equipment by Science and Technology Human Resources Development Project (STHRD), Ministry of Education

The STHRD Project has provided the equipment to the Faculty of Animal Science and Export Agriculture value of Rs.4,322,930. during the year 2024. Above assets have recorded the university books of accounts in the year 2024 with approval of the Council.

2.22.11 Revaluation of University Fixed Assets

The University fixed assets revaluation process is in progress. Revaluation of buildings and laboratory equipment completed during the year 2021 and 2022. During the year 2023, University appointed expert committee for revaluation of computer related items as per the provisions of Assets Management Circular No.04/2018 of General Treasury. The Committee carried out revaluation of computer related items (3589 units) including the 275 computers which were included in laboratory equipment and eliminated in revaluation of laboratory equipment in the year 2022. The revaluation committee has identified disposable computer items (1849 units) value of Rs.28,038,795. and recommended to apply the disposal procedures to removing such items from fixed assets registry.

National Audit Office has reported that disposal items value should be restated as Rs.20,550,936 for the items 1,045 due to non-completion of disposal process in the year 2023. Accordingly following amendments were made in the book of accounts in year 2024 with approval of the Council.

- I. The upgraded parts of computer 336 units were included in computer items and revalued the value of Rs. 3,939,219.
- II. The disposal value recorded as Rs.3,639,757 for software (expired) 400 units, consumable related parts 68 units and sub inventory items 27 units.
- III. The technology outdated teleconferencing unit, computer items which were not working 946 units and unidentified/ difficulty identified items 98 units were restated as disposal items value of Rs. 20,550,936 in the books of accounts.

The University Assets Revaluation Committee has decided to continue the revaluation process of other asset categories based on the directions given by University Audit and Management Committee. The Committee decided to apply of Revaluation Policy for Property, Plant and Equipment according to letter issued by the Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka dated 31st January 2024 to the Head of Finance, University Grants Commission.

2.22.12 Land Acquisition

The Divisional Secretary, Badulla has informed that Rs.59,321,250 to be deposited at the Court for the proceeding of clear ownership of existing used land by the University (Lot no. 1068 & 1069). In the year 2024, the University has paid above amounts to the Divisional Secretary, Badulla with recommendation of Finance Committee and approval of the Council to take over the clear ownership of above land.

The land acquisition process is going on for the land of 25 acres from Balangoda Plantation, Yatilamada Ela land for Faculty of Medicine and Agarathenna Land for Faculty of Animal Science and Export Agriculture.

2.22.13 Legal Proceedings against to the University

- I. There is a Court Case No.CA/Writ 226/2022 is going on for land acquisition of 12 acres of Wewessa Division, Balangoda Plantation Ltd.
- II. Removing of Industries from the University Premises, one industrialist Mr.Jagath Shantha Wijepala has filed a case in Supreme Court against to the university – Case No. SC/Appeal 60/2016. This Court Case is going on.
- III. Claim of Compensation for accident of assign vehicle (Librarian) Case No.- CL/92/2024 District Court, Badulla.
- IV. The adjudication process through CIDA is going on for Delay Payment Interest for Construction of Alternative Water Supply Project.

2.22.14 Related Party Disclosures

The key management personal of the University are the members of the University Council & the members of the senior management personal. The University Council is the executive body and governing authority of the University which consists of the Vice-Chancellor, Deans of the faculties, two members elected by the Senate and the external members appointed by the University Grants Commission. There is no any contracts entered between the university and any member of the key management personal who is having direct or indirect interest and there is no any Related-party transactions, including sales, purchases, loans, transfers, leasing arrangements,

guarantees, amount receivable from or payable to related parties other than the employee remuneration and allowances for services provided during the period.

2.22.15 Presentation of Budget Information in Financial Statements

Budgets to the university is approved cash basis annually. Although University financial statement covers all the financial activities of the university, budgets are approved only for the government grant. The Statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts compares the final budget to actual amounts calculated on the same basis as the corresponding budgetary amounts.

2.22.16 Donated Furniture by Department of Local Government (Uva Province)

The Department of Local Government (Uva Province) has donated the furniture value of Rs.162,145 to the use of Community Voluntary Centre of the University on 18th October 2023. Above assets need to be recorded in the University books of accounts.

Responses to the Auditor General's Report on the Financial Statements and Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements of Uva Wellassa University for the Year Ended 31 December 2024, in terms of Section 12 of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018

1.2

(a) Agreed with the audit observation.

The disclosure of information on three court cases presently under judicial consideration, instituted by or against the University, have been omitted from the notes to the financial statements for the year 2024. Necessary action will be taken to make the relevant disclosures as required.

(b) Agreed with the audit observation

The research expenditure relating to the year, included under non-current assets in the financial statements, has been fully amortized. Action will be taken in the future to disclose the amortization policy in the financial statements.

(c) Disagreed with the audit observation.

As the CESTour Project is still in operation, the value of E-Books purchased in 2024 has not been capitalized as intangible assets. Upon issuance of the project completion certificate, the assets relevant to the project will be taken over by the University and included in the annual financial statements.

(d) Disagreed with the audit observation.

The interest earned on fixed deposits established for the Sinharaja Project and other special funds maintained by the University is credited to the respective project account and specific fund accounts. Such interest income is not accounted for under the sundry income of the University. The interest income received relating to the Sinharaja Project is utilized for specific expenditure of the project (Salaries for Research Assistants) in accordance with the budget approved by the Finance Committee.

(e) Agreed with the audit observation

(f) Since the cleaning activities outside the canteen premises are required to be carried out by the University, payments made on behalf of them are correct. Out of the balance of Rs. 11,154,355 stated in the audit observation as recoverable to the University Fund, a sum of Rs. 3,279,892 represents payments made to workers engaged in cleaning outside the canteen, and therefore, this amount should be deducted from the balance of Rs. 11,154,355.

Payments made to workers engaged in cooking and food preparation in canteens were suspended from 20 February 2024, and the relevant parties were informed to refund the payments made up to that date. However, they refused to make such refunds. Therefore,

the matter will be submitted to the Finance Committee of the University for further action.

As it is not possible to recover this amount from the canteen owner under the terms of the agreement, it has not been accounted for as receivable income.

(g) Disagreed with the audit observation

Although information was requested from all departments of the University by letter No. UWU/FD/R/2024/53 dated 19.12.2024 regarding all balances payable as at 31.12.2024, provisions under sundry creditors were not made for the year 2024, since the final bill value payable for these capital works had not been definitively determined even by 10.01.2025.

(h) Disagreed with the audit observation

The expenditure incurred for the Alternative Water Supply Project has been capitalized under Land and Land Improvements, as it represents a cost related to land development.

(i) Disagreed with the audit observation

With regard to the payment of bills under the Alternative Water Supply Project, the University Council at its meeting held on 28.02.2025 decided, based on the recommendations of the appointed arbitrator for resolving the issue of delay charge payments between the University and the contractor, to obtain the advice of the Attorney General and initiate further legal action in this regard. Accordingly, as a final decision on the payment of delay charges has not yet been made by the Council, provisions for such payment have not been made in the financial statements.

(j) Based on the information submitted to the audit by the Postgraduate Unit, the difference between the postgraduate course income for 2024 and that shown in the financial statements for the same year has arisen due to the inclusion in the financial statements of receipts for academic transcripts, reporting of expired cheques again as income, and interest income earned on fixed deposits. Action will be taken to correctly account for the fixed deposit interest income amounting to Rs. 394,965.76 included therein.

(k) Regarding the five current accounts mentioned herein, a portion of the unidentified deposits was recognized and accounted for as income receivable as at 31 December 2024. The deposits that could not be so identified were accounted for as other income for the year 2025, and any remaining unidentified deposits will be properly accounted for in due course.

2.2.2

(a) Reminders have been sent during 2024 to the relevant suppliers concerning retention money amounting to Rs. 23,953,831 withheld in respect of various construction, supply, and service contracts. The suppliers who respond will be released

the relevant amounts, and the remaining balances will be credited to government revenue.

(i) When letters were sent to the bondholders, the guarantors and foreign embassies were also informed accordingly.

(ii) In accordance with Cabinet Paper No. 2004/ED/HE/45, Uva Wellassa University has, since its inception, taken measures to provide accommodation facilities for students and staff in order to obtain their contribution toward the rapid development of the University. At the initial stage, hostels were provided under the procurement process; however, with the increase in staff numbers, it became practically difficult to continue this arrangement. Accordingly, based on the recommendations of the University Housing Committee and the decision of the Council, from the year 2017, a portion of the rent paid by employees has been reimbursed to them under specified limits instead of providing hostels. This reimbursement, made with the approval of the Council under the powers vested in it by the Universities Act, is not considered an allowance paid with the salary but an expenditure included in the annual budget of the University.

At the 66th Audit and Management Committee meeting held on 22 December 2022, it was identified that this payment is a reimbursement and not an allowance, and the same was confirmed at the 67th Audit and Management Committee meeting held on 28 March 2024.

(iii) Accommodation facilities are provided for University Officers including the Vice-Chancellor's resident, six Senior Official Residences, and official quarters for staff members. The Vice-Chancellor's residence is allocated not only for his personal use but also to provide accommodation for ambassadors, vice-chancellors of other universities, and state leaders visiting the University. The officers residing in senior official residences are currently charged a monthly rent of Rs. 2,000, as recommended by the Housing Committee and approved by the Council.

A monthly rental of Rs. 1,000 is charged from officers residing in the Studio Apartment Complex and from all staff members, based on the recommendation of the Housing Committee and the approval of the Council.

Although these arrangements are not made under the University Circular, such rent charges are imposed with the approval of the Housing Committee and the Council, considering the operational requirements of the University. These measures have been implemented to retain staff members, which is essential for the continuity and development of the University.

(b) Due to reasons such as the insufficient number of academic staff compared to the increasing number of students, the inability to recruit replacements for those who resigned, and the excessive workload on the existing staff, it became necessary to obtain the services of visiting lecturers. Since these lecturers evaluate examination answer scripts after completing their other academic duties, it has not been possible to release examination results within the prescribed time period.

Furthermore, assigning a large number of answer scripts to individual lecturers and the delay in releasing results for certain subjects have collectively contributed to the overall delay in issuing final examination results within the stipulated time frame.

(c) Disagreed with the audit observation

Requests have been made to the General Treasury to obtain approval for the purchase of vehicles for university operations, and the Treasury has granted approval to use vehicles on a lease basis. (Annex 02)

(d) Finger print machines are used for recording the attendance of non-academic staff members at arrival and departure.

Within the university system, attendance of academic staff members is not recorded either through signature registers or fingerprint machines. The academic staff conduct their lectures according to the timetables provided at the beginning of the academic year, and those lecture records are maintained within each academic department. At the end of every month, prior to the payment of salaries and allowances, the Salaries Division obtains confirmation from the respective Heads of Departments regarding the active service of the academic staff members in their departments. Based on such confirmation, salaries and allowances are paid to the academic staff.

(e) With regard to the foreign-funded projects mentioned above, actions have been taken in accordance with sections 3(ii), 3(iii), and 3(c) of the Circular No. ERD/SC/PSC/22 dated 27 March 2023, issued by the Department of External Resources. Furthermore, by letter dated 19 April 2023 under Ref. No. UWU/FD/R/2023/14) under the title *“Submitting Information on Foreign Grants Received to Uva Wellassa University for the Year 2022,”* the Treasury was duly informed. Necessary arrangements will be made to inform the Director General of the Department of External Resources of the Treasury regarding the foreign grants received during the year 2024.

(f) Disagreed with the audit observation

Circular No. 737 of the University Grants Commission clearly specifies the procedure to be followed concerning the recovery of monies from academic staff who have breached their bond agreements. The University has already taken action in accordance with the provisions of this circular with respect to funds recovered from such bond breaches. Since the University Grants Commission has not yet suspended the actions required under this circular, the University is unable to remit the said recovered funds to the General Treasury. However, if a new circular is issued by the University Grants Commission in this regard, action will be taken accordingly.

(g) Disagreed with the audit observation

In 2016, the Finance Division of the University installed four computerized systems for recording transactions related to the General Ledger, Payroll, Stock, and Fixed Assets. Since it was not practically possible to install all systems simultaneously at the initial stage, priority-based installation was carried out. Accordingly, after completing the revaluation of assets under each category, a decision was made to update the Fixed Assets

software. Following the revaluation of computers, the fixed asset recording system related to laboratory equipment and computer accessories has been properly updated. As of 31 December 2024, fixed assets pertaining to computers and laboratory equipment have been updated, while data related to office equipment and sports equipment have been prepared in a format suitable for system entry. However, due to a shortage of supporting staff, the full operation of the system has been delayed. Work is in progress to update the computerized fixed asset reporting system, while the printed fixed asset register is maintained as usual by the General Administration Division.

2.3

(a) For the academic years 2022/2023 and 2023/2024, the University Grants Commission forwarded the lists of students registered for degree programmes to the University, and admissions were made accordingly. However, some students did not register at the University, while a few who had registered were subsequently transferred to other universities based on the instructions of the University Grants Commission. Consequently, due to such various reasons, the expected student intake of the University has decreased.

(b) Several written requests were submitted to the University Grants Commission to obtain approval for the construction of new student hostels. However, since the University Grants Commission and the General Treasury have not approved the respective projects or allocated funds for them, the University has not been able to proceed with such projects. Due to the increase in student admissions, the University has been compelled to provide hostel facilities by obtaining external hostels for the relevant students.

(c) A complaint was lodged on 07.07.2021 with the Deputy Inspector General of Police, Uva Province, regarding an alleged irregularity in the examination results of Mr. S. M. T. R. Samarathunga, and investigations in this regard are still ongoing.

In connection with this incident, the Officer-in-Charge of the Special Crimes Investigation Unit at the Badulla Police Station has reported the matter to the Honourable Magistrate's Court of Badulla under case number Badulla ©/C No. 44222, and legal proceedings have commenced. This has been informed to the University by letter No. BD/SCIB/OIC/448/2023 dated 06.04.2023. Future action will be taken in accordance with the judgment delivered by the Honourable Magistrate's Court. The case is scheduled to be heard again on 28 May 2025 before the Honourable Magistrate's Court of Badulla.

(d) According to the recommendations made in the letter No. UGC/IDD/GEN/01 issued by the University Grants Commission to expedite and formalize the process of legally transferring ownership of lands and buildings, a retired Land Commissioner possessing the required expertise was appointed by the University Council on 11 December 2017 to expedite the transfer of ownership of the lands acquired for the construction of Uva

Wellassa University. As the process of land acquisition is currently in its final stage, his service has been extended on an assignment basis for the period from 04 November 2024 to 03 May 2025.

(e) The scholarship value of Rs. 35,729,187 granted to four lecturers has been included in their respective bond values, and steps will be taken to recover the said amount from them.

(f) Due to the resignation of permanent staff members and the inability to fill approved permanent vacancies, the relevant vacancies have been temporarily filled to ensure the smooth conduct of academic activities. Therefore, this does not constitute an excess of academic staff.

Since new recruitments have been temporarily suspended, necessary recruitments will be made upon receiving the required approvals.

(g) A reply letter has been sent on 2024.11.08 to the letter No. UGC/HR/4/4/26/Mgt dated 2024.07.18, which was sent by the University Grants Commission to the Secretary of the Ministry of Education through the Chairman of the University Grants Commission. However, a response to that letter has not yet been received. Therefore, based on the urgent requirement of the University, the individual has been appointed as a Lecturer (temporarily), with the approval of the Council, until the approval of the University Grants Commission is obtained, and payments have been made in accordance with the salary and allowances entitled to the respective post.

It is noted that the approval of the Council was not disregarded. A letter requesting approval from the University Grants Commission was sent on 2024.02.19, and a reply was received from the University Grants Commission on 2024.04.08. A response to the Commission's letter No. UGC/HR/4/4/26/Mgt dated 2024.04.08 was sent on 2024.11.08. However, no reply has been received to that letter so far.

(h) The appointing authority for such positions is the University Grants Commission. When the University confirmed his appointment to the post of Deputy Registrar, the accuracy of his educational qualifications submitted at the time of appointment was duly verified with the relevant institutions.

He was appointed to the post of Senior Assistant Registrar by the University Grants Commission and, since 15 October 2008, has satisfactorily performed the duties assigned to that post. After his promotion to the post of Deputy Registrar effective from 7 October 2019, he has continued to carry out the responsibilities of that position satisfactorily. Accordingly, salaries, allowances, and other benefits applicable to those posts have been duly paid to him.

(i) An audit query was raised by the Government Audit regarding a Senior Assistant Librarian Grade II of the University, alleging that the officer concerned did not possess the required qualifications for the post. At the 60th meeting of the Audit and Management Committee held on 27 May 2022, it was proposed that her qualifications did not conform to those specified in the recruitment procedure for the post of Senior Assistant Librarian. Accordingly, it was recommended that the matter be referred to the Council to take necessary action in terms of Commission Circular No. 921.

Accordingly, at the 178th meeting of the Council held on 28 October 2022, it was decided to appoint a subcommittee consisting of two members to study the above matter and report to the Council. As per the Council Paper No. C/180/05/25, the observations and recommendations of the subcommittee are as follows:

- Dr. Kulatunga was recruited to the post of Assistant Librarian on 2 March 2009. Due to the heavy workload prevailing in the University Library at that time, she was unable to obtain study leave for about four years and five months. Consequently, she was unable to complete her PhD within the probationary period of eight years.
- Accordingly, at the 119th meeting of the Council held on 23 February 2017, it was decided to terminate her service with effect from 2 March 2017, as she failed to complete the PhD within the prescribed eight-year probationary period.
- Furthermore, the Council, taking into consideration her circumstances, decided to reappoint her to the post of Assistant Librarian on a contract basis for a period of one year from 2 March 2017 to 1 March 2018. Subsequently, the contract period was extended by another six months from 2 March 2018 to 31 August 2018.
- Dr. Kulatunga applied for the vacant post of Senior Assistant Librarian Grade II in response to the advertisement published in the national newspaper on 21 January 2018. Based on the recruitment procedure and the recommendation of the Librarian, she was found to be eligible and was invited to appear for the interview held on 20 July 2018.

The Selection Committee recommended to the Council her appointment to the post of Senior Assistant Librarian in accordance with the provisions of University Grants Commission Circular No. 921 dated 23 April 2010. At the 134th meeting of the Council held on 20 July 2018, it was decided to reappoint her to the post of Senior Assistant Librarian with effect from 01 August 2018.

- Her reappointment in 2018 through the open newspaper advertisement provided her the opportunity to rejoin the University. She had also paid in full the bond value that was due to the University.
- She possesses a Bachelor of Library Science (B.Lib) degree of one year, a Master of Library Science (M.Lib) degree of one year, and a Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) in Philosophy.

Considering these facts compassionately and taking into account that she had completed a Ph.D., the Council decided in 2018 to revise her appointment to the post of Senior Assistant Librarian as follows:

Accordingly, since a period of six years' experience was required and in order to consider her academic qualifications in the relevant field, the 180th meeting of the Council held on

23 December 2022 decided to include her in the Assistant Librarian (transitional grade) for a period of three years from 01 August 2018, and to promote her to the post of Senior Assistant Librarian Grade II with effect from 01 August 2021.

Based on the needs of the University, she has been appointed as the Acting Librarian, and accordingly, necessary arrangements have been made to grant her the relevant privileges, including the official allowance, official quarters, official vehicle, and fuel allowance.

(j) Court case No. CL/92/2024 relating to this matter is currently being heard before the District Court of Badulla. Since the vehicle concerned was obtained on a rental basis and is not owned by the University, the procedures laid down in the Establishments Code and Financial Regulations have not been followed. A written statement has been obtained from the officer concerned regarding the accident and filed for reference, to be used if necessary.

As it was not an assigned vehicle, transportation needs were met by allocating available vehicles from the pool, but the fuel allowance was not paid during that period.

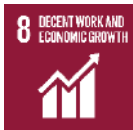

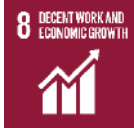
